THE MISTLETONES AT SOUTH STREET SEAPORT

CHRISTMAS IN RICHMOND TOWN

CAROLING AT THE MORGAN

Vocalists from the New School's Mannes College wander through the midtown cultural institution serenading families with holiday music from the 1800s through the present day.

HOLIDAY CAROLING CONCERT

THE FESTIVAL OF LESSONS AND CAROLS

Take a spin around the Rockefeller Center ice rink, then give young performers another winter treat: singing Christmas songs to a packed crowd at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Best suited for tweens and teens.

UNSILENT NIGHT

In this city, there are flash mobs for every occasionincluding yuletide anthems. If you and your brood would rather not raise your voices, Phil Kline's annual event offers an alternative take on run-ofthe-mill caroling: Instead of singing, participants use boom boxes and recorded

tunes to create a unified, traveling sound sculpture. The mile-long route begins at Washington Square Park and concludes at Tompkins Square Park, which is arguably the best place to catch the show if you don't plan on participating yourself. CHRISTMAS EVE CAROLING AT **WASHINGTON SQUARE PARK**

Locals gather on the night before Christmas to celebrate the season. The repertoire here is strictly old-school classics ("Jingle Bells" versus "Jingle Bell Rock"), but accompaniment from a brass quartet lends an extra-festive feeling. Bundle up and bring a thermos of hot cider to keep little ones warm as they stroll. Dec 24 at 5pm. Meet at Washington Square North at Fifth Ave (washington squarenyc.org). Free.

GREENWICH VILLAGE CAROLING WALK

Layer up and hit the streets for this 30-plus-year tradition. Artistic director Michael Conley leads tykes, parents and friends around the picturesque'hood, crooning 'Silent Night," "Silver Bells' and other traditional melodies. Songbooks are provided, so you won't have to fudge the lyrics as you wassail by the Washington Square Arch and other iconic spots. Dec 16 at 7pm.
